DROPPING OFF/COLLECTING YOUR SON/DAUGHTER FROM SCHOOL

Please note that, for health and safety reasons, we need to restrict the movement of traffic on the schools' sites to keep our pupils safe. Parking is unavoidably limited for visitors, particularly on our Prospect Hill Site. However, Mayfield Road has space for parking which is easy to access. There are many pupils leaving the site at 3.30pm and we need it to be as safe as possible for them. Please therefore avoid turning into the Prospect Hill car park if there is space on Mayfield Road. Please also be respectful of our school neighbours and do not block or park in their

private parking areas. This includes Beevers' Furniture Store car park - dropping off/collecting pupils from **Beevers' car park is not permitted**, nor is dropping off/collecting from our neighbours' parking areas at the top of the school driveway. The emergency access bay near to the field gate at our Prospect Hill Site also must be left clear at all times. When driving onto either school site, please note the 5mph speed limit and the reverse only policy for parking so that you only drive forwards out of any parking space. Thank you for your support with these matters.

HAS YOUR CHILD HAD THEIR EYES TESTED YET?

When should you get your child a free eye test?

Ideally children should start having regular eye tests from the age of four. But they can be tested at any age, even if they can't read or speak.

How do you book a free child's eye test?

Please book your child an eye test at an opticians, even if you have no concerns about their vision. To do this contact your local opticians - use this link for local practices **Find an optician - NHS**.

What will it cost?

Children under 16 are entitled to NHS-funded (FREE) eye tests. If your child needs glasses, they will receive a voucher to help with the cost.

Why should you get your child's eyes tested?

- being able to see clearly will mean your child is able to learn and develop at school and socially
- eyes are still developing in early childhood. An eye test helps pick up and treat any problems. This can help to prevent longer-term eye problems
- even if you think your child has normal vision it is still important to get their eyes tested
- they are no longer tested in school.

How can you tell if your child has an eye problem?

Some eye problems don't show any signs, so it is always best to take your child for an eye test.

Signs of a possible eye problem can include:

- having one eye that turns in or out
- difficulty concentrating
- behavioural problems
- headaches
- rubbing their eyes a lot
- sitting too close to the TV
- screwing up/closing one or both eyes
- holding things close to them.

An eye test is very important especially if there's a history of early glasses use, childhood eye problems, squint or lazy eye, in your family.

Did you know?

Short-sightedness is on the rise and has been linked to a range of factors including screen use. Help your child's eyes stay healthy by managing screen use and encouraging them to get outside often (this helps their eyesight).

SEVERE WEATHER ARRANGEMENTS

Under all circumstances, the safety of pupils will dictate our actions and the Headteacher, Head of School or Deputy Headteacher, will endeavour to work with all outside agencies to ensure the safety of all pupils.

The following points should help us all to be clear about what will occur in the event of extreme weather:

- once pupils/students are in school, we will normally keep them in school until the weather improves to ensure their safety; pupils/students requesting to go home early during a snowstorm should be discouraged
- pupils will be kept in form rooms/hall as directed by SLT until a staff register has been completed to ensure the normal timetable can operate. The instruction to allow pupils to leave form rooms/hall and resume their usual timetable will be given by SLT on site
- under normal circumstances, we will try to stick to our normal transport arrangements, as this is usually the safest plan for pupils/students
- if the weather is particularly poor and pupils/ students cannot get home, they will be able to stay in school, with supervision from senior staff. Information to parents regarding our severe weather arrangements will request that parents inform the school of an alternative "home" destination, that is likely to be more accessible, for those pupils/ students who live in particularly remote areas
- please note that this system can only work well if we have up to date contact information for both pupils and staff and therefore, the office must be kept

- updated of responsible adults and home contact information for pupils and students
- pupils/students should not make private arrangements. In poor weather, the Headteacher, Head of School or Deputy Headteacher will act centrally to try and ensure the best arrangements for everyone
- in the event of Whitby School needing to send pupils/students home early, staff will endeavour to contact a responsible adult who will accept responsibility for that pupil going home early. The school will remain responsible for all pupils/students until a parent/carer is able to ensure each pupil's safety. Parents will be notified of this and, if there are to be specific, individual arrangements for any pupil/student, in the event of pupils/students being sent home early, then the school must be informed of this, in advance, by parents/carer
- if the weather is poor overnight, the Headteacher, Head of School or Deputy Headteacher, will make decisions about transport at 7.00am, in consultation with the police and local transport providers. They will contact local Radio, BBC Radio York, Radio Cleveland and Capital FM (North East and Yorkshire)
- information will be put on the school's social media, as soon as possible, once a decision has been made to close the school
- prior to such occasions, parents should ensure that their son/daughter has suitable shoes, a warm coat, gloves, etc for winter weather.

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? Bluetooth tracking devices like Apple's AirTag and Samsung's SmartTags have exploded in popularity, with millions sold each year. These small tools help people locate their lost items, but their discreet design has also made them attractive for more sinister purposes. From stalking to bullying, tracking devices present unique risks that trusted adults need to understand and address.

STALKING AND HARASSMENT

Because of their tiny size and unassuming appearance, tracking devices can easily be hidden in bags or clothing. They've been used to monitor individuals without their knowledge, with a lawsuit in the US labelling AirTags "the weapon of choice of stalkers and abusers". In the UK, use of tracking devices in coercive control and stalking cases reportedly rose by 317 percent between 2018 and 2023.

TOOLS FOR BULLYING

Tracking devices could allow bullies to follow or locate their targets even outside of school. This makes it difficult for children to find refuge, potentially extending the trauma of bullying into spaces – like home that should feel safe and secure.

FALSE ACCUSATIONS

Because tracking devices are linked to user accounts, they could be misused to 'prove' ownership of someone else's possessions. Someone could, for example, plant a tracker on another person's belongings to

INVASION OF PRIVACY

These devices are designed to share location data with the user via other people's phones, which can unintentionally broadcast someone's movements without their consent. This makes them vulnerable to being monitored by strangers without realising.

DIFFICULT TO

Many tracking devices are designed to be discreet, but that also means they're easy to hide. Without proactive checking or the right tech to detect them, children and young people might not realise they're being tracked.

Advice for Parents & Educators

WATCH FOR WARNING SIGNS

If a child's peers always seem to know their location – whether in person or hinted at online – it could be worth checking for tracking devices. Some, like AirTags, will eventually make a noise if separated from their owner. Listen out for a chirping sound.

CHECK LIKELY HIDING SPOTS

Common places where trackers may be planted include jacket linings, bag seams, pockets, or under bike seats. If you find one, take a photo of the serial numbe before disposing of it – this could help police trace the account it's linked to.

USE DETECTION APPS


Apple devices running iOS 14.5 or later will notify users of unknown AirTags nearby. Android users can install Apple's 'Tracker Detect' or the third-party app 'AirGuard' to scan for tracking devices from various manufacturers.


HAVE THE CONVERSATION

Talk to your child about what tracking devices are, what signs to look out for, and how they might be misused. Emphasise the legal consequences of using them to prank, harass, or monitor someone.






