PACT: A Shared Ethos

At Whitby School, we know that the most powerful outcomes for pupils happen when school and home work together. That's why we're proud to be sharing our school ethos - PACT - with families this term. PACT stands for Patience, Ambition, Consistency, and Thoughtfulness.

This ethos was developed collaboratively by staff and shaped by feedback from across the school. It underpins our behaviour system and guides how we speak to and support our pupils every day. Our School Council also played a key role in ensuring every form group had a voice in its development.

We're now beginning a conversation with parents and carers about how we can extend this ethos into a **Home-School PACT**. This will form the basis of a shared agreement launching in September.

Here's a summary of each value we're sharing with families:

P is for Patience

We ask families to be patient with us when raising concerns, recognising that many of us teach and that thorough responses take time. In return, we commit to being patient with them – arranging meetings around their availability and responding as promptly as possible.

A is for Ambition

We're asking families to support their child's learning by encouraging attendance, supporting homework, and attending parents' evenings. In return, we commit to holding high aspirations for every pupil and celebrating their achievements, character, and courage.

C is for Consistency

We've explained the importance of consistency in applying policies – particularly around uniform, behaviour, and detentions. We've asked for their support even when they may not fully agree, and we've committed to applying systems fairly and communicating clearly.

T is for Thoughtfulness

We've encouraged families to approach disagreements with thoughtfulness and respect – just as we aim to do. We've acknowledged that mistakes happen, but that we are united by a shared goal: helping every pupil be the best they can be.

APPRENTICESHIP EVENING

On Tuesday 10 June we held our annual Apprenticeship Evening. The employers were able to share their hints and tips about how to create a successful CV or application form and how to stand out from the crowd. They also shared information about the various roles within a company and how they can be very surprising. Beyond Housing were there with details about their

SIMPSON BUILDERS MEETING AND VISIT

On Friday 13 June, Simpson, the building firm who are currently renovating Whitby Town Hall came to speak to Whitby School pupils who are interested in a job in construction. They learnt about the different types of practical jobs on a building site as well as the management jobs available too. They also got tips and an offer of help with creating CV's for the construction industry, as well as an explanation of the different apprenticeships that would be available to them. This has also included an offer for three young people to have some on site work experience over the summer holidays, which is an amazing opportunity and will ensure their CV really stands out!

If this wasn't enough, a group of twenty Year 9 pupils

were invited to go to the Town Hall site to have a look around and hear from the different people working on the site about the job itself. It also meant they could see for themselves the physical work that goes into renovating a listed building, including the craftsmanship required, such as stonemasonry. It was a great privilege for them to access the site, as most will have never seen inside the Town Hall.

The morning was a fantastic opportunity for the Whitby School pupils to learn from people within the construction industry about how to begin their career in this sector. Thank you to Simpson for taking the time to guide and support our young people.





MEETING WITH BEYOND HOUSING

On Friday 6 June, Beyond Housing came into school to talk to our pupils about the various job and apprenticeship opportunities available within their organisation. Our pupils met three different employees who all had lots of advice and help for our pupils, so they can be successful in their chosen field of work. They heard about the different qualifications required to work within a trade occupation, as well as hints and tips about making a successful application. They also heard about the reality of working within the different trades, including the best and worst parts of the various jobs, as well as the importance of work experience. This meeting will have really helped our



pupils to have a greater understanding about the jobs they are interested in and will help them to decide if they are something they would like to do in the future.



FIRE STATION TRIP



On Friday 13 June, the Achieve cohort were invited to have a day with the Fire and Rescue Service in Whitby. They spent the morning at the station where they were warmly welcomed with bacon butties, got the chance to look around the station, the fire engine and received a fantastic talk about what it means to become a firefighter. Three male and two female firefighters kindly gave up their time to help the young people get the most out of the day.

In the afternoon the team brought their fire engine to

the Airy Hill site where they delivered various activities such as dam building, first aid, fitness tests and team building/problem solving exercises. The obvious enthusiasm for the job from the fire team encouraged the whole group to get stuck in and participate in everything.


Whitby Coliseum have kindly agreed to give Whitby School a private screening of Michelangelo: Love and Death.

SEN PARENT FORUM

Since the SEN Parent Forum began over a year ago, we have seen many changes in Whitby Secondary Education. Originally formed to help SEN pupils and their families understand and adapt to the amalgamation of Eskdale and Caedmon Schools. We have been able to offer practical support, completing documentation and attending meetings in order to obtain EHCPs which in turn provides bespoke support for the child. We have signposted parents to other agencies who are available to offer help and advice in a wide range of areas of SEN, and we have shared personal experiences to hopefully help parents understand they need never feel isolated with the issues they are experiencing.

While all our amazing children are unique many of the problems they experience in school and the minefield of documents parents have to navigate to get additional support are generally the same for all SEN families. This group is the bridge between you worrying alone and finding the correct route towards a solution for you and your child. If we as a group are unable to help, we usually know someone who can.

A SEN Parent Forum focus group was started to give more parents the chance to ask questions and express their concerns. More recently we have continued with our regular meetings and collaborated with Mr Davies and the SEN Department. They have been very welcoming and supportive, demonstrating that we are all working towards embracing diversity and meeting the needs of all SEN pupils at the school. Some of our suggestions or questions have related to specific

individuals while others have affected the whole SEN community within school. The SEN team have also been able to share developments and proposals with us empowering us to feel part of the school community and have encouraged us to contribute towards the positive well being of our own children within the school setting. These have included issues relating to 'sensory school uniform', flexibility and support for children who are unable to commit to a fulltime timetable or who are unable to be part of a traditional class group, appropriate use of fidget items in class and additional equipment available to meet a wide range of learning needs. The staff at school can only put things in place for children if they know what is required and this group can take problems and hopefully some





solutions to the SEN Parents' Forum to enable the school to act in the best interest of your child.

We are aware that in the next few months there will be yet more new experiences for our young people, Year 8s transitioning to the upper site and the new Year 7s making the huge leap from Primary to Secondary school. For children and families these can be very worrying times and we hope that by offering you the opportunity to attend our meetings you will be able to raise your concerns, visit the site and meet other parents who have a wealth of SEN experience to share.

We will be holding meetings on the last Thursday of every month 10.00am-12.00noon at The Bungalow, Airy Hill Site, refreshments will be provided. You will also have the opportunity to tour the school if you have a child moving to secondary in September.

This group provides an opportunity for you to share your views and concerns about your child at school and to provide advice and help where we can. Without you there can be no change. Please come along, meet other parents and contribute to making positive changes for our SEN children and empower them to receive the educational opportunities and lifelong living skills they deserve to enable them to be fully prepared for further education, employment and the changing world that they are apart of.

The next meeting will be Thursday 26 June, 10.00am-12.00noon.

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

As its name suggests, YouTube Kids is a child-friendly version of Google's online video-sharing platform. Its colourful user interface is designed with young people in mind, and it offers a curated, family-friendly experience with features like age-based content settings and parental controls.



INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT BYPASSING FILTERS

YouTube Kids is less likely to show inappropriate material than YouTube, but there have been reports of the app showing age-inappropriate content to young viewers. One investigation found that YouTube Kids had shown videos that promote skin bleaching, weight loss, drug culture and firearms to children as young as two, as inappropriate content had bypassed the platform's algorithms

BE WARY OF

Like Google's regular YouTube app, YouTube Kids features pervasive advertising before a video plays. While these adverts are designed to be family friendly and are subject to a strict review process, it's worth noting that YouTube Kids collects information around and advertisements.

DESIGNED TO

platform's design features, such as the constant stream of new videos and the reward system of points or virtual stickers, can be very engaging and make it difficult for children to switch off. Research has shown that spending too much time using digital services such as YouTube can lead to screen addiction, affecting children's daily routines, studies, and even their social lives

SETTINGS CAN BE CIRCUMVENTED

YouTube Kids offers built-in parental controls, enabling you to set screen time limits and curate the content children are able to view; however, children are often more tech-savvy than we think. They can easily bypass or tweak these settings if they have access to the associated Google account password, thereby exposing themselves to age-inappropriate and

AI-GENERATED MISINFORMATION

There is also a risk of children accessing videos that contain disinformation and misinformation. A BBC investigation foun that some YouTube channels are using artificial misleading 'scientific' videos that are recommended to children as educational content. These videos included conspiracy theories and ideas that lack scientific backing

DATA COLLECTION

While there are limits on the data that YouTube can collect on children under 13, children can still inadvertently give away sensitive information when using YouTube Kids. The platform collects data on children's viewing habits, content searches and location, which YouTube and third-party advertisers can use.

Advice for Parents & Educators

PARENTAL CONTROLS

YouTube Kids offers several settings that allow you to manage what content children can view. For example, you can choose what level of content you want them to access, such as 'Preschool' or 'Younger'. You can also turn off the search function, so that only those videos approved by the YouTube Kids team themselves will appear on a child's recommendations list.

CHECK WATCH HISTORY

YouTube Kids has made it easy for you to keep an eye on what the children in your care have been watching on the app. By clicking on the The your care have been watching on the app. Sy clicking on the 'Recommended' icon at the top right of the home screen, you can see which videos they've been viewing, and how much of each. If a child watches YouTube Kids while signed into a Google account, you can check their history through Google's 'My Activity' page.

SET TIME LIMITS

The built-in parental controls let you keep a tab on how long children spend watching videos. You can set a timer that limits screen time and disables the YouTube Kids app once a specified length of time has been reached. It's also worth speaking to children about the dangers of spending too much time on YouTube, to ensure they remain focused on other, more important activities.

WATCH TOGETHER

It's important that you try to make YouTube Kids a fun and positive experience for children. One way to do this is by introducing watching sessions, where you all gather around and share the most enjoyable videos that you have recently watched. This can be a great way of giving you both new things to talk about and of keeping an eye on what they're watching.







Dropping Off/Collecting your Son/Daughter from School

Please note that, for health and safety reasons, we need to restrict the movement of traffic on the schools' sites to keep our pupils safe. Parking is unavoidably limited for visitors, particularly on our Prospect Hill Site. However, Mayfield Road has space for parking which is easy to access. There are many pupils leaving the site at 3.30pm and we need it to be as safe as possible for them. Please therefore avoid turning into the Prospect Hill car park if there is space on Mayfield Road. Please also be respectful of our school neighbours and do not block or park in their private parking areas. This includes Beevers' Furniture Store car park - dropping off/collecting pupils from Beevers' car park is not permitted, nor is dropping off/collecting from our neighbours' parking areas at the top of the school driveway. 
