PACT: A Shared Ethos (Part 2)

Last week, we introduced our school ethos - PACT - a shared commitment between school and home to uphold the values of Patience, Ambition, Consistency and Thoughtfulness. We explored how patience and ambition shape our daily work with pupils and how your support helps us raise aspirations and build character.

This week, we continue the conversation by looking at the final two values of our PACT - and how, together, we can model these for our children.

C is for Consistency

In 664 AD, **St. Hilda of Whitby** hosted the Synod of Whitby – a meeting that would shape the future of

she personally supported the Celtic tradition, she accepted the decision to follow Roman customs for the sake of unity. Her example reminds us that even when we don't fully agree, working together with respect and consistency is vital for the greater good.

At Whitby School, **consistency** is key to creating a safe, fair, and inclusive environment. One area where this is especially important is **uniform**. While we understand that families may have different views, our uniform policy is in place to:

- build a sense of community and belonging
- prevent pressure to wear expensive designer clothing
- allow pupils' character to shine through, not their clothes.





We know this can sometimes come into conflict with personal preferences – whether it's a hairstyle, piercings, or a particular cut of trousers or skirts. We simply ask that you consider the uniform policy before authorising these changes.

We also use **ClassCharts** to log behaviour concerns. These are not "negatives" – they are part of our revised behaviour policy and are intended to open up conversations and support. If your child feels a concern is unfair, we welcome dialogue. But ultimately, we ask for your support in reinforcing the importance of boundaries and expectations.

If a detention is issued, we understand it can be inconvenient. National guidance recognises that this is part of what makes detentions effective. We are always happy to reschedule if given notice, but we ask for your backing in helping us maintain high standards.

Just as we ask for consistency from families, we are committed to providing it in return - in how we apply our systems and how we communicate with you.

T is for Thoughtfulness

We all make mistakes. There will be times when the standard we expect - from pupils, staff, or even ourselves - falls short. But we are united by one goal: to help your child be the best they can be, do the best they can do, and grow into the best version of themselves.

When we disagree - whether it's about a uniform rule, a sanction, or a policy - we are always open to listening. Your feedback helps us improve. What matters most is that we continue to communicate **respectfully**, **openly**, and **thoughtfully**.

Together, we can make Whitby School a welcoming, exciting place to learn – a place where **ambition**, **character**, **endeavour**, and **courage** are lived every day.

In September, we will formally launch our **Home-School PACT** - a shared agreement that reflects the values we've explored over the past two weeks. A **draft version is attached to this newsletter**, and we would love to hear your thoughts.

THE WHITBY HOME-SCHOOL PACT DRAFT

This agreement reflects our shared commitment to the values of Patience, Ambition, Consistency and Thoughtfulness.

P - Have I been **patient** in dealing with concerns?

Home will:

- understand that thorough investigations take time
- communicate respectfully and allow time for responses
- recognise that staff may not be able to respond outside of working hours
- approach concerns calmly and constructively.

School will:

- aim to respond to emails and concerns within five working days
- we will prioritise cases that relate to the immediate safety of children
- communicate clearly about who to contact and when
- keep families informed about the progress of any ongoing concerns.

A - Am I ambitious for my child's education?

Home will:

- encourage excellent attendance
- support homework routines
- attend parents' and carers' evenings and engage with school staff
- encourage my child to take pride in their learning and achievements
- support my child in setting goals and celebrating progress.

School will:

- hold high aspirations for every pupil
- monitor and support progress through tracking systems
- celebrate pupils' achievements and character development
- provide a broad, balanced, and adaptive curriculum that supports all learners
- offer opportunities for pupils to develop leadership, creativity, and independence.

C - Together do we support **consistency** with our school policies?

Home will:

- ensure my child adheres to the uniform policy
- engage with ClassCharts
- support the school's detention policy
- read and support the school's policies, including behaviour and mobile phone use
- notify the school of any changes to contact details or circumstances that may affect learning.

School will:

- apply policies fairly and transparently across all pupils
- communicate clearly about expectations and concerns
- provide clear explanations for decisions and sanctions where necessary.

T - Are we **thoughtful** in interactions between home and school?

Home will:

- communicate respectfully and openly
- use the school's complaints policy and process to give us an opportunity to make things right before sharing concerns publicly
- work together with the school for my child's best interest
- treat all members of the school community with respect
- engage in school life where possible (eg, events, volunteering, feedback).

School will:

- listen to and consider feedback from families
- maintain respectful and open communication
- work collaboratively with families to support each pupil
- recognise and respond to individual needs and circumstances
- reflect on feedback to improve school practice and culture.






BOWES MUSEUM VISIT

observe the birds and animals. Michelle really loved the pigs as they were playful, hairy and black and brown. We fed them rotten lettuce but they seemed to love them! They were so greedy and were pushing each other out of the way to get to the lettuce. The goats were real characters and were having fights - head butting each other and playing. It was really interesting to see the foxes who had been rescued and a peacock with beautiful, colourful feathers. There were also turtles, seagulls, owls and even a raven.

We were all really impressed by the care that the volunteers take over the birds and animals that are brought to them and hope that we can go back soon.



What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

NINTENDOSWITCH2

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? Nintendo launched its Switch 2 games console in early June 2025 – its first new console in eight years. While it builds on the original's success by remaining compatible with certain existing games, it also adds powerful hardware and new features like GameChat and a USB-C camera. As more children look to upgrade, it's important to understand how this new console might affect their play and safety.

EASIER TO ACCESS MATURE CONTENT




Despite Nintendo's reputation for family-friendly titles, mature games like Cyberpunk 2077 and Hitman have been released onto the platform. With the Switch 2's improved performance, developers will be able to port even more mature-rated games. These may appeal to children due to their popularity, but they contain content that is highly unsuitable for young audiences.

IN-APP & GAME STORE PURCHASES

The Nintendo eShop enables purchases with just a few taps. If payment details are saved and PIN protection is disabled, children may unknowingly make costly purchases – including game add-ons, cosmetic items or entire new releases – without parental approva

UNRESTRICTED ONLINE PLAY IN SOME GAMES



GAMECHAT & REAL-TIME VOICE COMMUNICATION
GameChat enables live chatting with un

GameChat enables live chatting with up to 12 people, even across different games, with optional video and screen-sharing. Though children under 16 are restricted to chatting only with approved friends, the sheer interactivity could raise privacy concerns or create pressure to remain online longer.

CAMERA COMPATIBILITY & PRIVACY CONCERNS

The optional USB-C camera supports video calling and facial overlays in games; however, this also raises the risk of cyberbullying or the unwanted sharing of personal images. The camera can be disabled, removed or covered, and parental controls are essential to manage how and when it is used.

POWERFUL PULL OF FAMILIAR CHARACTERS

Nintendo's mascot, Mario – along with Pikachu, Donkey Kong and others – remains hugely appealing to younger audiences, especially after the success of the recent film, 'The Super Mario Bros. Movie' (2023). These beloved icons are central to Nintendo's branding and often feature in merchandising, adverts and in-game promotions, creating strong emotional attachments in children and a sense of urgency to keep up with their peers.

Advice for Parents & Educators

CHECK RATINGS & USE PARENTAL CONTROLS

Every Switch and Switch 2 game comes with a PEGI age rating. Before buying one, ensure the content matches your child's age. Use the Nintendo Parental Controls ages to making agreement your consulting lights and agreement productions.

REMOVE OR RESTRICT PAYMENT METHODS

Avoid accidental spending by unlinking credit cards from the device. Instead, consider adding funds via prepaid eShop cards or requiring a PIN for purchases Some banking apps can also be set to approve transactions manually.

REVIEW FRIEND LISTS AND CHAT PERMISSIONS

Child profiles are restricted to chatting with approved friends only, but it's good practice to regularly check their friend list and communication settings. Use the Parental Controls app to switch off voice or video chat if necessary.


ENCOURAGE OPEN CONVERSATIONS

Teach children how to block, report and capture any behaviour or content that makes them uncomfortable. The console's built-in tools allow them to create screenshots and video clips, which can aid in reporting any issues. Keeping an open dialogue helps children feel supported and safe.



Where does our food come from?



Our weekly bags are made up of surplus food from supermarkets, food manufacturers and farmers. We never know what we're going to get from day to day, which means each week your bag of food will be different.

But it is always quality, fresh produce. You will probably need to top up from the shops as well, but our food will go a long way to helping will help you feed your family affordably.

Surplus food happens for lots of reasons – sometimes there is a fault with the packaging or there may just be too much of it for the supermarkets to handle.

Some of our food is beyond its BEST BEFORE date BUT that doesn't mean that you can't eat it. With proper storage - for instance in its original packaging and sealed with a clip or in an airtight container - lots of foodstuffs can be eaten long after their best before date, including:

- Crisps can still be edible for a good month after their best before deadline.
- Biscuits and cereals can last for another six months.
- Baked beans and other tinned goods can last in your store cupboard for a whole
 year, as can sweets and bottled pasta sauce.
- And don't throw away that packet of dried pasta that you've found at the back of a cupboard. If stored correctly, it should still be safe to eat around three years after its best before date has expired.

We will never provide food that is after its USE BY date because this is about food safety, not food quality. You can eat food on its USE BY date or, if you have a freezer, pop it in. Just make sure you make a note of how long it will be freezer safe and how long it takes to defrost.
